Symphony League Spotlight: Maestro Daniel Stewart

"Danny" was born in the Potrero Hill area of San Francisco and grew up in Rohnert Park. His Mom was an English teacher, and Dad's hobby was singing in a barbershop quartet. The family listened to the popular San Francisco classical music radio station KDFC. As a child of 4-5, Danny took lessons in the famous Suzuki violin method of teaching very young children to play what some might consider a rather difficult instrument. He progressed to playing the viola and as a teenager joined the San Francisco Youth Symphony and performed in Davies Symphony Hall.

He considered the sport of baseball, or possibly computer design, but eventually decided to focus on music as a career and his parents supported him. He earned a degree in Music and Performance from Indiana University School of Music and spent 6 consecutive summers playing viola in Switzerland including extensive international touring and playing in many of the Great Halls of the world.

Eventually he was drawn to conducting, and went to the New World Symphony in Miami, founded by Elmer Bernstein. There he played principal viola, studied conducting with Michael Tilson Thomas, and met his wife In Sun Jang, a violinist who was also studying there. In Sun won a position with the San Francisco Symphony, and Danny went to the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia, then to the Metropolitan Opera in New York as its conductor for several years. Their home base was in San Francisco so there were lots of red eye flights. But there were some bright spots, for instance, a serendipitous meeting with YoYo Ma on one flight gave them 5 hours to sit and chat about their many shared interests and experiences. Wonderful!

By chance, Danny saw an advertisement that Santa Cruz California was looking for a music director for its Symphony. That was 12 years ago, and the rest is history! Although he has had offers from other prestigious companies, it has been our good fortune that he decided to stay in Santa Cruz.

Danny has become a loved and respected member of our community and has brought the Symphony new energy and creative programing. With a varied mix of classics, pops, Shakespeare Santa Cruz collaborations, local musicians and performers and some of his own compositions, each concert brings something new and stimulating.

Danny has traveled to over 40 countries performing and conducting. If he hadn't chosen Music as a career, Danny says he might have gone into film making or been a DJ. Danny never seems to be outwardly stressed and is known for his good nature and pleasant down-to-earth personality. At the concert after-parties he comes exhilarated from the performance and always has time to sit and visit with musicians, donors, volunteers and concert attendees.

Thanks Danny, for providing us with so much glorious music. We are happy and grateful that you are part of our world here in Santa Cruz and Watsonville!

Spotlight on League President: Anna Hackenbracht By Betty Dodd, League Member

"I love the Symphony and I love the Community it brings together to support it."

Those were Anna's words spoken in conversation recently. All of us who know Anna will attest that she has been an important part of this community since she joined the League as a member and now president.

Anna grew up in Concord California and learned to love classical music by hearing it played in the background on radio and recordings in the family home. As a child, music lessons were encouraged and "expected" and she learned piano at age 5 and flute at age 9.

As a political science major at Pomona College in Southern California, she interned with soon to be Senator Paul Tsongas and helped work on his campaign. After graduating, Anna became involved in a number of national and progressive organizations advocating and lobbying for legislation to address issues facing low income families, small scale farmers, and associated environmental issues. While working in Sacramento she led a successful effort to waive regulations that restricted farmers markets. Although we see these markets everywhere now and take them for granted, at that time there were only a few in the entire country.

Anna continued her education by completing a doctoral program at Johns Hopkins University in the Department of Geography and Environmental Engineering in Washington DC. Her thesis focused on Water distribution, a very important issue in the Western United States.

Husband David Koo had a postdoctoral position in Astronomy at several institutions. Eventually in 1988, Anna and David returned to California and settled in Santa Cruz, where David had a tenured position in the Astronomy Department at UCSC. Anna's excellent background and qualifications led her to a 27 year career with the EPA regional office in San Francisco. Although this was a long commute, she loved partnering with States and Tribes on environmental priorities and one of her favorites was Hawaii, with its unique environmental challenges. Through traveling to Astronomy and EPA conferences worldwide, David and Anna have developed friendships in many different countries and continents, and David still maintains ties with family living in China. In early 2000, they adopted two wonderful children from China, Miranda and Qun.

Anna had always loved the Symphony, and after going to some previews with former League members Sheila and Clyde Vaughan she eventually joined the League in 2019. She soon became co-president with Mary Ann Orr, and when Mary Ann stepped aside, Anna took over as president. With her organizational skills and background in conducting meetings she is able to keep us all focused on the goals and aims of the League.

Another love is Theater, and as a close friend of Audrey Stanley (founding Artistic Director of Shakespeare Santa Cruz), Anna became involved with that company and serves on the Board. It has been especially gratifying to see the Symphony now collaborating with SSC and continuing Theater with the Symphony, a natural partnership. That was a big success last season, and we will see it continued this year in the upcoming Symphony production of Amadeus.

In her spare time, Anna can't stop organizing, but now it's book club, the League and Santa Cruz Shakespeare, She enjoys reading nonfiction, learning to cook new cuisines (currently trying to master Chinese Dim Sum), singing in the Cabrillo Symphonic Chorus, enjoying the Golden State Warriors, and planning trips to see family and friends. Some favorite restaurants are Jack O'Neill's for visitors, the latest Chinese restaurant recommended by David's Chinese postdocs, Mobo Sushi, and Pete's Fish House.

And so, we at the League, are happy that a gal with her feet on the ground and a guy with his head in the stars (and Galaxies) decided to include us in their orbit for more journeys around the sun!

Sheherazade! Magic! Mystery! Music!

Cava hislleria Rusticana, followed by Elgar's great Cello Concerto in E minor, his emotionally charged lament, featuring Jonah Kim as soloist in this technically complicated and powerful number. Prior to the concert, the audience is invited to participate in costume (or not) in a street fair outside the Civic Auditorium. Think seven veils? Belly dancing? Persian nobleman? Everything will have a middle Eastern theme in preparation for the Rimsky-Korsakov musical depiction of Scheherazade and her legendary stories, which comprise the classic "Arabian Nights."

The opening concert for the Symphony season 20225-26 begins with the moving

Scheherazade, a beautiful and clever woman, was able to save her own life and that of many women in her country by telling suspenseful and imaginative tales to a King who was convinced that all women were unfaithful. By saving the ending of the story until the next day, Scheherazade escaped her fate and told the King another story the next night, using the same ploy to trick him into sparing her for another day. According to the mythology, this went on for 1001 nights, hence the title "1001 Nights" or Arabian Nights.

Our own wonderful Nancy Zhou on her violin brings us the voice of Scheherazade as the stories we all know from childhood come alive in music..... Aladdin and the magic lamp... Sinbad the Sailor, flying carpets.... Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves and so many others. Think of all these tales of magic and wonder while listening to this fascinating music.

The Planets Mythology and Science meet in Music Interview with Garth Illingworth By Betty Dodd

From flying carpets to spaceships, our next concert of Holst' composition combines Mythology with Science. The ancient Roman astronomers named the planets for their gods. For example, Mars is the god of war, and Venus is the goddess of love and peace. By giving the Planets personalities and human forms that people could relate to, it transformed scientific objects into subjects for creative storytelling that people loved.

Imagine your ship soaring through outer space, encountering different planets who have the characteristics of these various gods. Mars in his rages, then on to Jupiter, known for frivolity; it gradually meets Venus the goddess of love and Saturn who personifies old age, as your ship glides through the planets and galaxies.

According to League member and astronomer Garth Illingworth, this connection between Science and Mythology and the visual impact of seeing the planets from the Hubble and Webb telescopes is so awe inspiring that it engenders emotions in us humans that must be expressed, and what better way than through music? Although composer Holst would not have had access to the advanced technology of today's telescopes, which are orbiting and can actually see the individual planets, the Mystery continues as human culture loves to imagine what might exist in other galaxies...life on other planets? little green men? Star Wars?

As the scientists continue their search, humans pause to dream; so while you listen to the music, close your eyes and



She was a wife, mother, grandmother, friend, colleague, and an example to us all for how to live your best life.

Plans for a memorial service are pending. For now, let's all raise a toast for dear Helen.
